Who Are We?

 A volunteer group of Dog Handlers as well as experienced wilderness and search personnel typically called out by the Virginia Department of Emergency Management (VDEM) and or local fire & police to assist in locating the missing*

^{*} We can be called out by someone other than fire or police, according to our MOU with the state.

Example of SAR & SAR Dogs Use

- Children lost in the wilderness, parks or around the house
- Elderly persons and/or Alzheimer's patients
- Hikers and hunters lost in the woods
- Victims of natural disasters
- Crime scene evidence, victim recovery

Becoming a SAR Dog Handler

- Starts with the dog
 - A healthy, athletic, & agile dog
 - Highly obedient
 - Non aggressive
 - Loves the task of using it's senses to search, i.e., a great nose

Becoming a SAR Dog Handler

- Then the Dog Handler
 - A physically fit individual
 - Strong map reading & navigation skills
 - Radio communication skills
 - wilderness survival
 - first aid
 - Commitment to frequent travel (24/7)
 - Desire to carry gear, water, and manage a dog in a variety of conditions for the purpose of searching for missing people

Becoming an Operational SAR Dog Handler...the minimum

- "Typically" takes 2 years of weekly training
- Each Dog Handler must complete a series practical exams in Search & Rescue [20, 40, & 160 acre] mock searches
- Written examination
- HAM radio license

Additional Requirements

- Attend VDEM courses in SAR
- Stay abreast of SAR technology such as professional workshops & seminars
- Constantly train your dog in agility, nonaggression, and obedience

Virginia SAR Dog Units:

- Are:
- All Volunteer
- Requested by VDEM and or local fire/police*
- Assist law authorities
- Assist emergency services

- Are not:
- paid or reimbursed
- requested by private individuals
- law enforcement centered


How do K9 Alert SAR dogs work?



Air-scent dogs

- Millions of our skin cells slough off and fall to the ground (approx 40,000 p/min)
- Wind can pick up scent and carry it for several hundred yards
- Dogs are trained to use this scent and follow it to a person
- Coning effect

Air-scent dogs

- They will find other people in the area
- Dogs can work at night
- Rain and water will not hinder dogs ability to locate people
- Hot weather will make searching harder on the dogs (Chimney Effect)
- Can find people hidden in heavy / dense brush
